Key Facts

- Values are those ideas that we use to make decisions in life

- Christians try to follow Jesus' example in their lives and live up to his ideals.
- Parables are stories taught by Jesus to show how people should live.
- Humanism is a non religious way of life.
- Humanists believe we should be good without God.
- Humanists think carefully for themselves about the best way to live and to think about the effects of their actions on others
